# Smooth Transitions

### Mission:

To address our shared responsibility for improving hospital transfers from planned community-based births to promote greater patient safety and satisfaction.

### **Goals:**

- Improve whole person safety\* and efficiency of the transfer process through the establishment of systemwide protocols
- Collect and analyze transfer outcome data for the purpose of quality improvement
- Build greater collaboration between community-based midwives, EMS, and hospital care team
- Enhance the patient experience of care when transfers occur

# Smooth Transitions Quality Improvement Program

- Launched in 2009 under the auspices of the Washington State Perinatal Collaborative
- Since 2018, it has been housed at the Foundation for Health Care Quality
- 21 hospitals currently participating in the program; 7 additional hospitals are onboarding

- Perinatal Transfer Committee meetings
- Qualitative data collection through 360-degree surveys -
- Creative problem-solving to improve quality of care and patient experience

# LICENSED MIDWIVES IN WASHINGTON STATE

Washington's Licensed Midwives (LMs) are part of our healthcare system



3500+ births per year (more than 4 percent of all births) are attended by the 175+ licensed midwives in Washington State.



Work in the state's 20+ licensed freestanding birth centers and in homes.



Can accept most insurance, including Medicald. Liability insurance is available (1M/3M policies).



Licensed and regulated by the Washington State Department of Health.



Attend an accredited 3-year midwifery education program or the equivalent.

Programs meet or exceed requirements set by the International Confederation of Midwives and the North American Registry of Midwives.

Must attend a minimum of 100 births under supervision during clinical training.

### Licensed Midwives Provide Comprehensive, Family-Centered Care



Prenatal care and ongoing risk assessment

Mental health screening and referrals





Ordering labs and ultrasounds

Newborn care up to 2 weeks

Edministration of modifications as model Consistent presence during labor and birth



### WHO CAN LMs CARE FOR?

LMs are autonomous providers who typically care for low-risk parents and babies during the normal childbearing cycle.

### HOW IS RISK EVALUATED, AND WHEN DO LMs CONSIDER TRANSFER OF CARE?

Professional midwifery associations in Washington developed comprehensive guidance outlining conditions that a midwife may encounter in practice for which discussion, consultation, or transfer of care is indicated.

### WHO DECIDES WHEN A CLIENT SHOULD TRANSFER?

Like all health care providers, LMs have an ethical obligation to engage in a process of <u>shared</u> decision-making with their clients.

# Postpartum & Newborn Care

- Complete newborn exam at birth
- Care for the newborn (up to 2 weeks)
- Home/clinic visits (24hr, 3-5d, 1-2wk), phone calls, and final postpartum visits at 6-8 weeks
- Newborn metabolic screening
- CCHD screening
- Newborn hearing screening
- Weight checks
- Jaundice assessment-labs prn
- RH negative protocol-RHIG
- Hepatitis B Vaccine
- Breastfeeding support
- Screening for postpartum mood disorders
- Referrals to newborn care providers and lactation specialists prn



# WA State Birth Data (2020)

Total births *	84,259	
Hospitals	80,581	95.6%
Freestanding Birth Centers	1,426	1.7%
Home Births	2,147	2.5%

# Community Birth Outcomes MAWS Data in OB COAP 2015 - 2020

- 11,442 planned community births (at time of labor)
  - 85% of these births (n=9,737) occurred in their intended location (home or birth center)
  - Overall c-section rate was 5.3% (n=608)
    - Nulliparous c-section rate was 12.4% (n=507)
    - Multiparous c-section rate/no prior history of c-section was 1.0% (n=72)
    - Multiparous c-section rate/labor after prior c-section was 10.7% (n=29)
  - Spontaneous vaginal birth rate was 93.8% (n=10,733)
  - Physiologic birth rate was 84.1% (n=9,626)

# **Community Birth Transfers Data in OB COAP 2015 - 2020**

<mark>14.9%</mark> (1,705)
32.3% (1,326)
5.2% (379)
<mark>35.7%</mark> (608)
<mark>2.9%</mark> (284)
1.0% (117)
<mark>2.1%</mark> (201)
2.3% (266)
<mark>0.87%</mark> (10)


